A Message from the Director

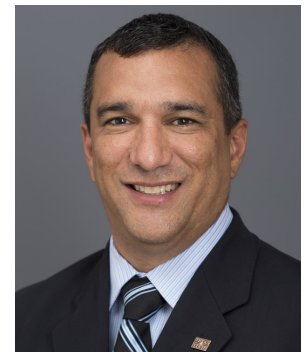

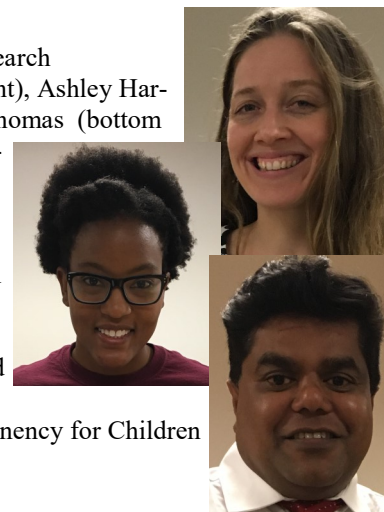
Research Forum

BSW and MSW students who are in their BSW or MSW Advanced final field practicum are required to complete a research project as a part of their final internship which culminates with participation in the Field Research Project Presentation formerly the Research Forum. Students present a professional quality PowerPoint presentation of their research project generated during their final field experience.

This allows faculty, field instructors, agency staff and fellow students the opportunity to be introduced to the various types of research completed while the student was conducting their internship. Each student presents their research project and fields questions from those in attendance. Next one is December 15th. Pictured are three of our graduates who have

Self-Care and Mindfulness in Times of Stress

Balancing work and life as a professional is stressful at times. There is a self-care technique that involves having a transition from work to home. Try creating a ritual of some kind on your way home, just before you enter your home, or right after you get in. You can stop by a park and take a 10-minute walk. Or if you have a bench, swing, or even the steps of your home, take 10 minutes before you go inside your home to enjoy the birds and flowers around you; breathing

in the fresh air. Another idea is getting into some comfy clothes and putting your work clothes “away” along with whatever happened at work that day.

There are many stress reducing self-care techniques. Buy a bath bomb and take a warm, relaxing bath. Try to squeeze in some time to get coffee or a meal with a friend (maybe tell each other jokes!). If you have kids, get one of those adult coloring books and have a coloring session. If you want to, try to take up yoga—it can be

extremely calming and de-stressing. You can also practice mindfulness at work to get back into focus. It can take from 5 minutes to 30 minutes—you decide! You can try this guided mindful meditation at <https://youtu.be/dEzbdLn2bJc> or you can try sitting straight up in your chair, stretching your arms and legs out, and just focus on your breathing for a couple of minutes. Mindfulness has been proven to increase your effectiveness by refining your focus and awareness.

New Resources Added to the Family Engagement Inventory

Child Welfare Information Gateway updated information and resources on the Family Engagement Inventory (FEI). The FEI is an interactive web-based tool designed to provide professionals in child welfare, juvenile justice, behavioral health, education, and early childhood education with a rich inventory of resources about family engagement and how it is defined and implemented across these fields of practice. The FEI aims to help practitioners, managers, and system leaders understand the commonalities and differences in family engagement in order to support cross-

system collaboration among multiple systems often working with the same families. The updated inventory includes features such as the most recent information and resources about family engagement, recent information pertaining to engaging incarcerated parents, current information on culturally responsive family and youth engagement, and effective ways to use the Family Engagement Inventory across disciplines.
